

Section 2. General Description


2.1 Product Overview

This manual provides instructions for installing and replacing the Grand Effects® 24" - 30" Fire Pit Inserts.

A CAUTION

The Grand Effects Fire Pit Inserts are not serviceable and therefore contain no serviceable parts. In order to prevent risk of property damage and/or injury, no service should be attempted to the bowl in the event of a malfunction. The Fire Box Burner Assembly must be sent back to a Grand Effects service center for repair. A certified gas professional should remove and re-install the Fire Box Burner Assembly.

Section 3. Installing the Grand Effects® 24" - 30" Fire Pit Inserts

WARNING

Risk of Electrical Shock or Electrocution. This fire pit must be installed by a licensed or certified electrician or a qualified pool serviceman in accordance with the National Electrical Code® (Canadian Electrical Code, in Canada) and all applicable local codes and ordinances. Improper installation will create an electrical hazard, which could result in death or serious injury to pool or spa users, installers or others due to electrical shock, and may also cause damage to property.

Always disconnect the power to the Pit at the circuit breaker before installing or servicing the bowl. Failure to do so could result in death or serious injury to serviceman, pool or spa users or others due to electrical shock.

3.1 Preparing the Fire Pit Inserts for Installation

NOTE: The electrician must complete preparatory steps before fire pit is installed.

The National Electrical Code (NEC®) allows listed low-voltage gas fired-luminaires, decorative fireplaces, fire pits, and similar equipment using low voltage ignitors that do not require grounding, and are supplied by a listed transformer / power supply with outputs that do not exceed the low-voltage contact limit (15 V RMS ac, 30 V continuous dc) to be permitted to be located less than 1.5 m (5 ft) from the inside walls of the pool.

Metallic equipment, including metallic gas piping, shall be bonded in accordance with the National Electrical Code in the US, and Canadian Electrical Code in Canada.

BONDING

In the United States the National Electrical Code® (NEC®) and in Canada the Canadian Electrical Code (CEC), require that all metallic components of a pool structure, including reinforcing steel, metal fittings and above ground components be bonded together (forming an equipotential bonding grid) with a solid copper conductor not smaller than an 8 AWG (6 AWG in Canada).

Additionally, Zodiac Pool Systems LLC, requires that as required by Article 680 of the NEC, the appliance be properly connected to an equipotential bonding grid/loop that includes all electrical equipment in the system and on the equipment pad. Bonding lugs must be connected with a solid copper wire at least 8 AWG (6 AWG in Canada) or larger. Failure to do so may void the Zodiac Pool Systems LLC warranty.

A CAUTION

To prevent premature failure of the appliance resulting from stray voltages and voltage differentials, the burner must be bonded to other equipment which is part of the pool plumbing system with a solid copper wire not smaller in diameter than 8 AWG (6 AWG) in Canada).

BONDING THE BURNER

Note: The Burner insert contains a bonding lug near the pilot on the bottom.

- Loosen the setscrew.
- 2. Insert the bond wire into the hole.
- 3. Tighten the setscrew until the bond wire is secured into place.




Figure 1. Bonding Lug on Burner Assembly

3.2 Gas and Electric Requirements

Note: Check with your gas supplier to verify gas flows and pressures available at the location of your installation. In many cases utility companies will install larger meters at no charge to accommodate larger flows.

3.3 Installing the Fire Pit Inserts

WARNING

Do not install near any combustibles such as wood structures, fuels, clothing, fabrics, or dry vegetation.

Keep surrounding area clear of all debris such as paper, leaves, pine-needles and other combustible materials.

WARNING

This unit is for outdoor use only.

Recommended CSA/AGA Clearances: Sides 4 ft / Top 6 ft

A LP gas regulator should never be installed in the fire pit. It should be installed by a gas expert in a remote location away from the heat source.

Install burner assembly out of the way of pedestrian traffic.

Installation shall be performed by a licensed contractor. All aspects of installation must conform to local or national codes, or in the absence of codes, with Natural Fuel Gas Code NFPA® 54 / ANSI Z223.1.

Using fire brick to line the inside of the fire pit is not recommended. Fire brick will retain heat and may result in overheating of the electronics.




Figure 2. Natural Gas




Figure 3. Propane Gas




Figure 4. Commercial Installation

The control panel and approved gas valve must be located where they can be easily accessible so that the gas can be shut off quickly in case of an emergency. 1. Install the control panel and gas piping as shown in Figure 2: Natural Gas, Figure 3: Propane Gas, or Figure 4: Commercial Installation. Gas lines must be clean and free from any dirt, debris, or contamination.

Note: Piping and fire pit construction are different for natural gas and propane gas.

2. The gas piping must be installed underground between the control panel and each burner, as shown in Figure 2, 3 and 4.




Figure 5. Natural Gas - Residential Installation




Figure 6. Propane - Residential Installation




Figure 7. Natural Gas - Commercial Installation

- 3. The piping must be reduced to 3/4" NPT or larger at the burner, as shown in Figure 5, 6 and 7.
- At each burner, install a 90° gas pipe elbow on the gas line for proper installation of a gas hose. Do not kink or make a tight radius bend on the gas hose.

IMPORTANT: Do not come straight up with the gas hose. As shown in Figure 5, 6 and 7, a 90° gas pipe elbow must be installed on the gas line for proper installation of the gas hose. The product warranty is voided if it is not installed with an elbow.

- 5. Install low voltage wiring (14 or 16 ga. 24VAC) underground between the control panel and each burner assembly. Wire per Grand Effects® wiring diagram. 120v source into the control panel can come from any 120v source, including auxiliary relay from the pool controller or home system. Typically, the pool controller is the device that turns the unit on and off. If a pool controller is not available, Grand Effects can provide a hand held remote system or an electrician can wire a decorative switch for on/off control up stream of the Grand Effects control panel.
- Maintain good piping practice by keeping pipe length and elbows to a minimum to eliminate unnecessary pressure drops. Corrugated flex gas lines should not be used.
- 7. The Support Plate can be installed in a few different methods. Smaller Support Plates can be supported using legs (threaded rod) supplied by Grand Effects. When using threaded rod, adjust the height of the support plate as shown in Figures 5, 6 and 7. Cut off the excessive length of bolts. When using threaded rod as legs, the bottom of the fire pit should be concrete to support the weight of the Support Plate, Burner Assembly and decorative media. When using larger Support Plates, stainless "L" brackets may be sufficient to hold Support Plate and burner assembly and media. If not, then structural galvanized angle iron cross members should be included. Cross member supports should be fixed and laid across fire pit in a rigid manner to hold Support Plate, Burner Assembly and decorative media. Venting the air gap at the bottom of the fire pit walls is required for cooling the burner assembly as shown in Figure 5 and Figure 6.




Figure 8. Propane - Commercial Installation

- 8. Venting is required to keep burner electronics from overheating. Venting is achieved with air holes located at the bottom of the fire pit walls as shown in Figures 5, 6, 7 and 8.
- **NOTE:** Providing good drainage is critical. Fire Pits using propane should not have drains located at bottom of cavity. Drainage should be achieved with vent holes located at bottom of side walls as shown in Figures 6 and 8.
- **IMPORTANT:** There is an 18" minimum depth requirement on residential fire pits and 24" minimum depth on commercial fire pits as shown in Figures 5, 6, 7 and 8.
- 9. On commercial installations, it is recommended to install a keyed switch and kill switch located in close proximity and in visible sight of feature or features. The keyed and kill switches must be electrically wired into the 110v upstream of the Grand Effects® Control Panel.




Figure 9. Natural Gas - Residential Installation

- Install the Sub-panel at the bottom of Fire pit as shown in Figures 9,
 10, 11 and 12. It is important to have good drainage as warranty is void if Sub-panel becomes submerged with water. The burner assembly must be centered and supported by the support plate.
- 11. Securely connect all electrical wires from the conrol panel and burner assembly, using wire nuts which are listed/certified for the application by a Nationally Recognized Testing Lab (NRTL) such as UL, CSA, or ETL. Be careful to hook up "X1" to "X1" and "X2" to "X2". To further protect and insulate the connections, wrap the wire-nut connections with NRTL-listed/certified electrical tape. Install electrical Burner Ground and Burner Spark from Sub-panel to burner.
- Install pilot and main gas hoses from Sub-panel to Burner Assembly.
 With all gas connections tight, position the burner assembly so that it sits level on the Support Plate.




Figure 10. Propane Gas - Residential Installation




Figure 11. Natural Gas - Commercial Installation




Figure 12. Propane Gas - Commercial Installation

Section 4. Burner Setup and Adjustment

4.1 Burner Setup

- 1. At the control panel, turn the manual gas valve to the "Off" position.
- 2. With 120VAC coming into the Control Panel, turn the switch located in the panel to the "On" position.
- At the burner assembly, check that the spark electrode is arcing across
 to the pilot hood. You should be able to hear and see the electrode
 spark. If there is no spark, make sure that the burner assembly is
 receiving 24VAC from the control panel.
- 4. Reposition the burner assembly so that it is sitting level in the pit.
- 5. At the control panel, open the manual gas valve.
- 6. In the control panel, turn the burner switch to the "On" position.
- 7. After the burner assembly has been lit, it can now be adjusted for flame size by adjusting the ball valve or keyed valve.
- 8. Install decorative rock or glass on top of the "burner support" and burner assembly. Larger lava rock is recommended (2" 4" in size). It will work better than smaller rock. Make sure that all rock is clear of the pilot area and hood area. Pilot hood area needs to remain clear of rock for proper ventilation.

NOTE: Do not use glass with propane installations. (If you use glass with natural gas, you will need to lay down pre-cut stainless mesh screen to prevent glass from falling through.

NOTE: Both sides of the pilot hood need to be clear of rock for proper ventilation.

WARNING

Use only approved decorative media to cover the burner assembly.

Lava and tumbled lava/ceramic stone and fire glass are all accepted media.

To avoid the risk of property damage and serious injury, including death, use caution when in the immediate area, as pieces may pop or explode when exposed to heat or when wet and exposed to heat.

IMPORTANT: Do not use fire glass with propane installations.

IMPORTANT:

At this time, the burner assembly should light. If the burner does not light, it may be a result of air in the gas line. Purging the air from the gas line may be required. If this happens, carefully purge the air from the gas line by disconnecting the gas hose from the burner assembly. The end of the gas hose should be outside of the bowl when purging air from the gas line.

WARNING

To avoid the risk of property damage and serious injury, including death, when purging air from a propane system, be sure to disconnect wires going to the burner assemblies (terminals X1/X2) located in Grand Effects® control panel. There should be no power at the burner assemblies when purging propane. The propane adder valve should remain wired and energized when purging. After purging is complete, make sure the area is vented and free from built-up gas.

Reinstall wires at X1/X2 terminals, thus providing power to burner assemblies.

4.2 Burner Adjustment

Note: The burner should have a flame height of approximately 12" from the top of the bowl. If the burner is adjusted too low, it will create an unstable pilot, resulting in possible On/Off cycling.

- 1. The height of the flame can be adjusted at each burner by opening or closing the 3/4" gas valve or keyed valve as shown in Figure 4.
- 2. After the burner has been adjusted, make sure that the burner assembly is repositioned so that it is sitting level in the pit.

Section 5. Maintenance

Periodically clean the burner assembly and pit with a wet cloth or cleaning solution to remove carbon build-up.

Frequency of the cleaning will depend on usage.

Periodically inspect the underside of the burner assembly for any signs of excessive temperatures.

Check that all gas connections are tight.

The units should be cycled frequently, especially after a rain. The burner assembly will not work in snow and ice conditions. The burner assembly should be covered and protected from snow and ice. The burner should not be operated in high wind conditions. High winds can limit the cooling air required for cooling of the burner assembly and cause over heating of the electronics.

Important: Gas must be securely shut off when not in use.

Note: If any problems are present, consult a licensed heating specialist or

call Grand Effects®.

Section 6. Operation

▲ WARNING! This unit is for outdoor use only. For your safety:

- If you smell gas, shut off the gas valve immediately.
- Extinguish any open flame.
- If odor continues, immediately call your gas supplier.
- Do not store or use gasoline or other flammable vapors and/or liquids in the vicinity of this appliance.
- Do not leave flame on while unsupervised.
- Do not operate in windy or rainy conditions. If this is done, the unit will cycle on and off automatically.
- Unit should be operated only by a responsible adult.
- When in use, an open flame is present; therefore, use with extreme care and at your own risk.
- Before any inspection of the unit, always turn off power and gas supply at the control panel.
- If you experience problems with this unit, call Grand Effects or a licensed heating professional. All work on this unit must be performed by a licensed heating professional.

WARNING

To avoid the risk of property damage and serious injury, including death, before you turn on the Grand Effects System, make sure that features are clear of people, animals, or any objects that are combustible.

6.1 Operating Instructions

To turn unit "On":

1. Energize power to Grand Effects® Transformer.

To turn unit "Off":

1. De-energize power to Grand Effects Transformer.

Note: If burner fails to light, turn corresponding burner switch in the control panel to the "Off" position, and then to the "On" position. This will initiate a new trial for ignition.

Section 7. Troubleshooting

WARNING

To avoid the risk of property damage and serious injury, including death, call Grand Effects® or a licensed heating professional if you experience problems with this unit. All work on this unit must be performed by a licensed heating professional.

▲ WARNINGStandard Fire Box Burner

In order to avoid the risk of property damage, serious injury, including death, turn OFF power and gas at the control panel prior to initiating troubleshooting steps. Turn power and gas ON once troubleshooting is complete. Some steps may require power and gas to be temporarily ON for verification, but turned OFF for repair (see bolded step).

	2.	Confirm if gas is coming out of the pilot; you can hear it. (Use a BBQ lighter to determine if gas is coming out of the pilot.)		
	3.	If no pilot gas, check that gas is turned on.		
	4.	Pilot orifice may be plugged. Replace pilot assembly.		
	5.	If still no gas, pilot valve may not be opening. Turn gas off and confirm if pilot solenoid is energizing.		
	6.	If not energizing, replace the ignition module. If it is energizing, but the valve is not opening or is dirty, replace the gas manifold.		





Burner goes On/Off		Is it going off because of wind? If so, how windy? Slight breeze or gusty? (If wind, rotate burner assembly in bowl so wind is not blowing across pilot.)			
	2.	If using glass, make sure an open pilot hood is used. Remove rock/ glass away from pilot area. Does it get better? How much glass? Thin down glass on burner assembly.			
	3.	Remove all rock/glass from the burner assembly. Does the problem go away?			
	4.	If gas pressure is too low or main burner is adjusted too low, the pilot will be too small and unstable.			
	5.	If burner shuts off after a 30-minute period and then goes off and doesn't come back on, replace the ignition module.			
Pilot comes on but no main burner		If possible, confirm that main gas solenoid is energizing. If not possible, replace the ignition module.			
	2.	Main burner solenoid may have to be replaced if buzzing. Look for signs of overheating.			
Main burner or pilot does not shut off	1.	If the valve is not opening or is dirty, replace the gas manifold.
